It gives us great pleasure to extend an invitation to you for the 49th All India Sociological Conference (AISC) of the Indian Sociological Society (ISS). The conference will be hosted by BML Munjal University (BMU), Haryana on the theme "Sociology, Development, and Democracy" from 22nd to 24th December, 2024. The conference invites delegates including renowned sociologists, professors, early career scholars, practitioners, and research scholars and students. We hope this conference will enrich our collective understanding of contemporary sociological issues. This brochure provides the required information to participate in the conference. We look forward to welcoming you.

CONFERENCE THEME

SOCIOLOGY, DEVELOPMENT AND DEMOCRACY

Sociology, development and democracy are historically and conceptually linked. It was in a fast changing world where industrial capitalism transformed everyday lives that the sociological perspective emerged. As the nature of work and homes changed, the sacred questioned, established authorities and divinely ordained knowledge interrogated that the social sciences and sociology arose as new forms of disciplinary inquiry. New methods of investigation of the social arose that sought evidence-based knowledge that relied on explicitly stated theories, critical methodologies, and robust techniques of empirical observation. This knowledge was used to understand structural issues such as inequalities, and experiences such as alienation and estrangement. As we reach the end of the first quarter of the 21st century, societies face a whole new set of challenges, which yet again affect our homes and work while questioning the very efficacy and legitimacy of sociological knowledge.

The first crisis relates to the devastation caused by unprecedented events such as global warming, wars, pandemics and violence. The second to a breakdown in

societies of a broad consensus from the middle of the 20th century that peace, development, democracy and social justice are desirable goals; and that social sciences such as sociology play an important role in this agenda of transformation. The third relates to an idea that knowledge is decided by diktat rather than methodological rules. Even if we do not enter debates about Post Truth times, as students, teachers and researchers we are confronted with a mediatised social, a pervasive presence of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and a digital social that compels us to rethink core sociological categories such as selfhoods and communities, constraint and choice.

There is today therefore an imperative need to revisit the relationship between Sociology, development and democracy. This becomes even more urgent as we witness the rise of a general view that sociology is not relevant as evidenced in increasing instances of closing down of sociology departments.





The foundational pillars of Indian sociology were once anchored in rural and agrarian research. Economic globalization and liberalization led to a separation of agriculture from its earlier entwinement with rural existence. The growing complexity within rural society and agrarian structures, has reshaped traditional linkages along the axes of caste, communities, class and gender. Village society is not what it used to be. Likewise, the urban has seen dramatic transformation. Events around us have alerted us to the consequences of a rapacious model of development such as global warming and growing social inequalities. These, in turn, have impacted the nature of democracy.

One has also witnessed that democracy has been questioned by the rise of neoliberalism and authoritarianism. One line of argument that has accompanied the rise of neoliberalism is that of economic efficiency wherein democracy is perceived as time-consuming and an obstacle to economic growth. The other is a celebration of individual entrepreneurship and success wherein the poor are seen as having failed because of their individual inadequacies. The idea of an unfettered individual violates the fundamental premise of Sociology where

the individual is always located in a social context. Sociology as a discipline is a productive site to debunk taken for granted knowledge and ask questions such as "why state welfare to the poor is seen as waste while wasteful consumption is seen as productive". Unfortunately, too often social sciences have operated with dominant ideas in circulation blurring distinctions between common sense and sociological knowledge. The sociologist ideally should be driven time and again, by the very logic of their discipline, to debunk the social systems one is studying. The roots of the debunking motif in sociology are however not psychological but methodological.

This conference hopes to initiate important conversations and scholarship in this direction. We look forward to both core theoretical papers well as rich empirical ones. We encourage papers on the themes listed below (but are not limited to these): Some of the themes that we wish to explore include:

- **Democracy and knowledge**
- **Role of social sciences in the contemporary context**
- **Development: the rural and urban**
- **Development, democracy and religiosity**
- **Development, and technology**
- **Family and gender**
- **Migration and displacements**
- **Development, climate, and democracy**
- **Social movements, development, and the youth**
- **Childhood and global development**

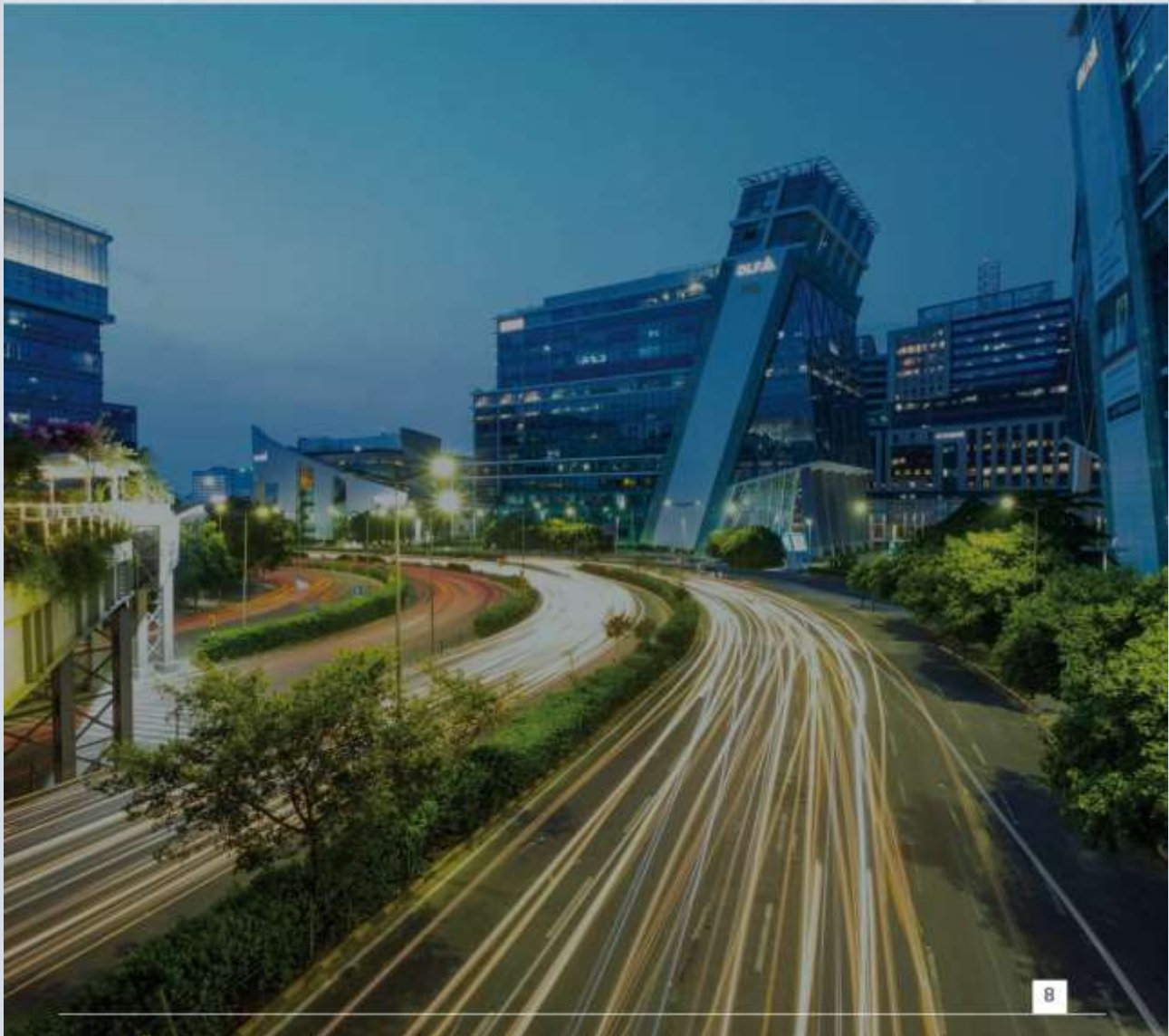

ABOUT THE DELHI-NCR REGION

The National Capital Region (NCR) that surrounds Delhi includes the capital city alongside the several districts from the states of Uttar Pradesh, Haryana and Rajasthan. The ever-expanding NCR was created in 1985 to facilitate a more systematised land use policy and better infrastructural development. The NCR is primarily a rural, peri-urban and urban area that contains ecologically sensitive spots like the Aravalli ridge, forests, wildlife and bird sanctuaries. The Nehar Wildlife sanctuary in Rewari is close to the BMU Campus. The Surajpur Bird Sanctuary and Biodiversity park near Gurgaon is a birdwatchers' delight and the wetlands attract several migratory birds during the winter season. Research Committee on Family, Marriage, and Kinship (RC- 02)

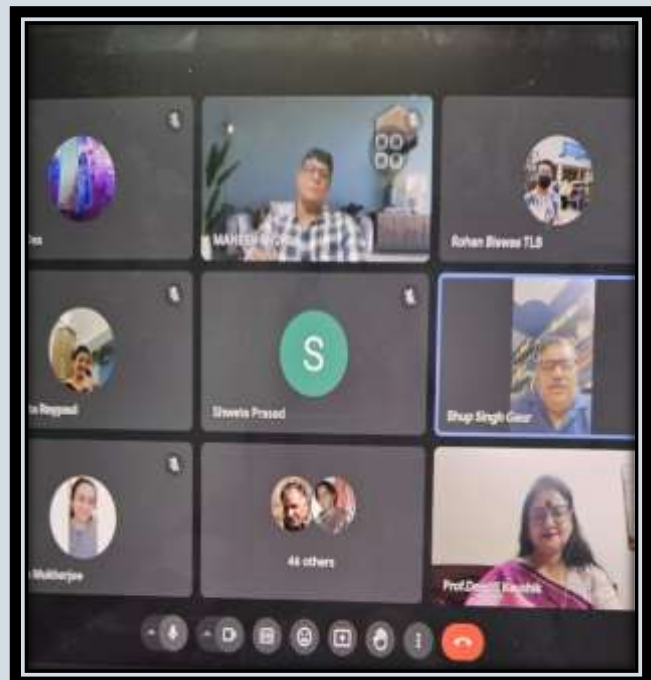

Prof. Tanweer Fazal, Professor, Department of Sociology, University of Hyderabad delivered an online special lecture on 6th May 2024 titled, “The Making of Minority: Conceptual History and Sociological Complexities.” Prof. Maitrayee Chaudhuri, President, Indian Sociological Society chaired the session and moderated the discussions. Prof. Fazal traced the conceptual history of the term ‘minority’ to the formation of nation-states in Western Europe. He then narrated the multiple categories involved in the construction of ‘minority’ such as race, gender, ethnicity and religion. Thereafter he dwelt at length on the processes that go into the making of minorities in different contexts, emphasizing the forging of boundaries and the symbolic construction of communities. He argued that constructions of majority and minority are historically contingent projects and emphasised how power re-configures identities and induces minoritization. The lecture, attended by around 90 participants, followed by a lively and engaging discussion with interventions from the floor.

The workshop brought together distinguished academicians and experts in the field of sociology and anthropology to discuss the pressing challenges and policy issues related to tribal communities in India.

Prof. Nilika Mehrotra from Jawaharlal Nehru University spoke on the pressing gender issues in tribal society; Prof. Nita Mathur from IGNOU, New Delhi, discussed the challenges of the impact of the market on the tribals; Dr. Avitoli Zhimo from the Department of Anthropology, University of Delhi, provided insights into the challenges of North East tribals; Prof. P. S. Vivek from the Department of Sociology, University of Mumbai, and the Treasurer of ISS elaborated on the woes and the plight of the Tribes in Maharashtra; Prof. D. R. Sahu, Head of the Sociology Department at the University of Lucknow, addressed the movement issues of the tribals. The workshop organizer Prof. Sukant K. Chaudhury said that the policies need a revamp in the Amrit kaal otherwise the tribal people themselves become an agency which will may pose a challenge to the government. It was a largely participated workshop by 911 registered participants.

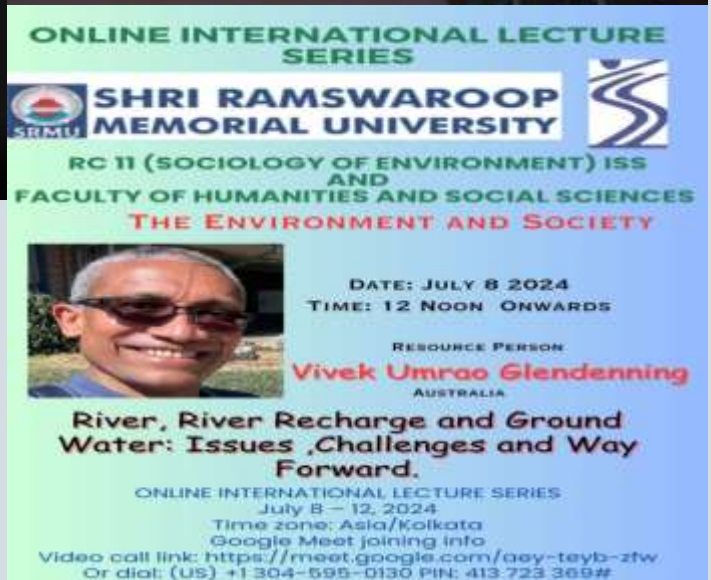

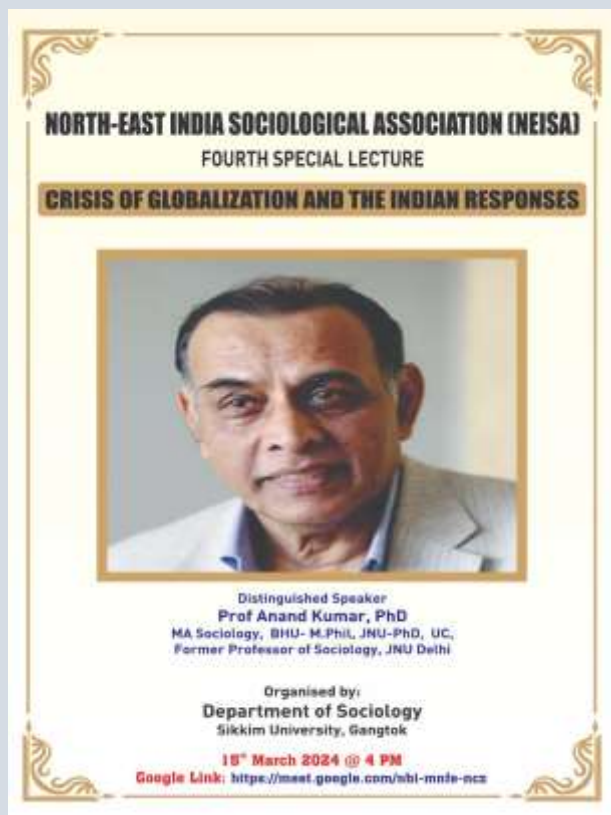

SOCIOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION OF NORTH EASTERN INDIA (SANEI)**



The fourth Special Lecture Series (online) of the Sociological Association of North Eastern India (SANEI) was held on 15th March 2024. It was organized by the Department of Sociology, Sikkim University. The distinguished sociologist Prof. Anand Kumar (JNU) delivered a lecture on Crisis of Globalisation and Indian Responses. Prof. Ajailiu Niumai, University of Hyderabad, chaired the session, and Prof. Sandhya Thapa, Department of Sociology, Sikkim University, warmly welcomed the distinguished speaker, faculty, and students. Prof. Temjensonang from Nagaland University introduced Prof. Anand Kumar to the audience. He also argued that while globalisation is supposed to be future-oriented, it collapses in our contemporary times of Artificial Intelligence (AI). He highlighted three crises of globalisation and the responses to them.

1. There is a new digital divide in the world, and there are countries deprived of the cyber revolution. This has created a deep divide in some countries and has made it complicated, creating new disparity.
2. Globalisation creates a problem of harmonious existence. The crisis of globalisation is the lack of a system of cooperation. He cited the Russia-Ukraine and Israel-Palestine wars.
3. Globalisation is indicated by the adoption of the 17 points of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and highlighted its possible effects.

Prof. Anand Kumar emphasized how globalisation has brought some benefits to India, including economic growth, increased foreign investment, and improved connectivity. To be precise, he said that the gender justice movement accelerated due to globalisation, where policymakers and law enforcement agencies were put to shame. He cited the Criminal Law (Amendment) Act of 2013, also known as the Nirbhaya Act, which was passed in response to the gang rape of a young woman in Delhi in December 2012. This Act made many visible changes to the Indian Penal Code, the Criminal Procedure Code, and the Indian Evidence Act. Another example he cited was the implementation of 33% reservation for women. He opined that globalisation has made India stand 'not singular,' but that India's affairs have become a global issue. He said that Amazon and YouTube channels have made India more global.

In the context of identity and nationalism, he argued that there is a return of nationalism in India today, but it is a cultural nationalism and not political nationalism. There is an attempt for cultural homogenisation as some people assumed that there are threats to traditional Indian culture and values arise. Secondly, there is a new wave of identity politics, and he cited the situation in Kashmir and the violent conflict in Manipur that started on 3rd May 2023 and how the conflict affected the ethnic atmosphere in many multi-ethnic metropolitan cities. Having said that, he argued that globalisation has widened the gap between 'the haves' and the 'have nots.' Moreover, automation and outsourcing have affected employment in India due to globalisation. He also mentioned the environmental impact, resource depletion, and consumerist culture in Indian society. He argued that there is a dependence on global markets, which creates vulnerability to international economic fluctuations.

In principle, he raised serious questions about how globalisation implies a multi-faceted and complex phenomenon, having both constructive and destructive ramifications in socio-economic and cultural aspects, as well as political consequences. For him, globalisation has made us more vulnerable. It creates a world without borders and makes us painfully aware of the limitations of our present situation. He argued that globalisation is not a monolithic force but an evolving set of consequences—some good, some bad, and some unintended.

The Sociological Association of North Eastern India (SANEI) is extremely grateful to him for sharing his insights into India's experience with globalisation and strategies for navigating its challenges. In a nutshell, he provided a way forward to tackle the crisis of globalisation. It was a lucid lecture, followed by a vibrant Q & A session. The lecture concluded with a vote of thanks proposed by Prof. Swati A. Sachdeva from Sikkim University.

1ST ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF CHHATTISGARH SOCIOLOGICAL SOCIETY

The first annual conference of the Chhattisgarh Sociological Association (CGSA), organized in

collaboration with the School of Sociology and Social Work, Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur, took place on June 28-29, 2024. The conference's theme, "Status of Tribal Women in the Global Context," brought together scholars, researchers, and professors from across India to present research papers. The event was coordinated by CGSA President Prof. Preeti Sharma and organizing committee head Prof. L.S. Gajpal. Key speakers included Prasanna R., Commissioner of Higher Education,



Chhattisgarh, and Dr. Sukhdarshan Nayak from Sambalpur University, Odisha, who emphasized the need for field studies to address the real conditions of tribal women for their empowerment.



The event also featured special guests like Dr. Aruna Palta, Vice-Chancellor of Hemchand Yadav University, and Prof. Shweta Prasad from the Indian Sociological Society, who highlighted the untapped potential of tribal women and the importance of their inclusion in mainstream society. Around 25 research papers were presented on topics such as the socio-economic status of tribal women, the impact of globalization, and welfare programs aimed at their empowerment. The conference concluded with a call for dedicated efforts towards

tribal women's empowerment and ongoing sociological research in this area.
