ISS OFFICE BEARERS OVER THE YEARS

The office bearers—particularly the Presidents and Secretaries—of the Indian Sociological Society have played a pivotal role in shaping the trajectory of sociology in India through their leadership, institution-building efforts, and scholarly contributions.

Foundational Leadership

G. S. Ghurye is widely regarded as the founder of the Indian Sociological Society. As the first Head of the Department of Sociology at the University of Bombay, he revitalized the discipline in India and established the Society in 1951, along with its flagship journal, *Sociological Bulletin*. His seminal work, *Caste and Race in India*, continues to be a foundational text in Indian sociological literature.

M. N. Srinivas, who served as President of the Society in 1967, played a crucial role in strengthening its institutional framework. During his tenure, the integration of parallel sociological bodies led to the consolidation of the All India Sociological Conference (AISC) as the principal national forum for sociologists, thereby enhancing the coherence and visibility of the discipline in India.

Scholarly Contributions by Presidents and Secretaries

Ramkrishna Mukherjee (President, 1973–75)

A distinguished sociologist and statistician, Mukherjee made significant methodological contributions to the discipline. His work, *Dynamics of a Rural Society*, introduced a dialectical approach to the study of Indian society, and his presidency coincided with a period of methodological innovation.

Shyama Charan Dube (President, 1975–76)

An eminent anthropologist and sociologist, Dube also served as Director of the Indian Institute of Advanced Study, Shimla, and later as Vice-Chancellor of Jammu University. His leadership in the Society reflected his broader intellectual influence in the field of Indian sociology.

T. K. Oommen (President, 1998–99)

Oommen held several important positions within and beyond the Society, including Secretary of the ISS and Secretary-General of the XI World Congress of Sociology (1986). His tenure was marked by enhanced international engagement and the promotion of Indian sociology on the global stage.

A. M. Shah (President, 1992–93; Secretary, 1967–72)

A.M. Shah made foundational contributions to the study of family and household structures in India. His leadership within the Society played a key role in institutionalizing sociological research and strengthening academic networks.

A. R. Desai (President, 1980–81)

A leading figure in Indian sociology, Desai was known for his commitment to social justice and critical sociology. His presidency emphasized the role of sociology as an instrument for understanding and transforming society.

Institutional Contributions

Under the leadership of its office bearers, the Indian Sociological Society has:

- Organized the All India Sociological Conferences, fostering sustained national-level academic dialogue.

- Published *Sociological Bulletin*, providing a key platform for scholarly exchange.
- Established a national office in New Delhi to streamline administrative and organizational functions.
- Developed a Code of Ethics to guide professional conduct within the discipline.

ISS ENDOWMENTS

PROFESSOR M. N. SRINIVAS ENDOWMENT FUND

Professor M. N. Srinivas Endowment Fund was set up jointly by the Indian Sociological Society (ISS) and the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR) in 2001. The fund was constituted of the following: (a) donation of accumulated royalties on the five volumes of Social Structure and Change published in honour of Prof. Srinivas given by its Editors — A.M. Shah, B.S. Baviskar, E.A. Ramaswamy— to Indian Sociological Society, amounting to Rs. 142,236.00 as on 15 May 2000; (b) a grant of Rs.2 lakh given by the ICSSR to the ISS; and (c) subsequent royalties on the five volumes donated by the Editors to ISS from year to year. A Committee composed of the following manages the Fund: (i) the President of ISS, who is also be the Chairman of the Committee, (ii) one sociologist or

social anthropologist nominated by the ICSSR, and (iii) one of the three Editors of Social Structure and Change, namely, A.M. Shah, B.S. Baviskar or E.A. Ramaswamy in the order in which their names are mentioned. When none of them is available, the Managing Committee of ISS will nominate a panel of three eminent sociologists or social anthropologists out of which the President of ISS will choose one to be a member of the Fund Committee in place of the editors. The income from the Fund will be used for two main purposes: a) to arrange for a distinguished sociologist or social anthropologist to deliver the Prof. M.N. Srinivas Memorial Lecture annually, and b) to annually award to a young sociologist or social anthropologist the Prof. M. N. Srinivas Memorial Prize for publishing the best sociological or social anthropological paper in any of the social science journals or edited books published in India. The honorarium for the Srinivas Lecture and the amount of the Srinivas Prize will be paid from the Fund accounts.

AISC OVER THE YEARS

The All India Sociological Conference (AISC) was first initiated in 1955 and was formally integrated with the Indian Sociological Society in 1965. A significant turning point in its institutional development occurred during the 1960s, particularly with the appointment of M. N. Srinivas as President of the Society in 1967.

During this period, two separate bodies were organizing similar sociological conferences in India, leading to a degree of duplication in efforts and fragmentation within the discipline. The critical shift took place when these bodies were brought together under the aegis of the Indian Sociological Society.

Following this merger, the AISC emerged as the official and unified national platform for sociologists across the country. This institutional consolidation substantially enhanced the scale, inclusivity, and academic significance of the conference, thereby strengthening its role in shaping the direction and development of sociology in India.

RC-01: Theory and Practice in Sociology

Following is the report of the sessions held at SRM University from 28th- 30th December 2025

46 abstracts received

24 papers were actually presented out of 30 abstracts selected.

RC 01 also organized two special lectures. The first was on Feminist Epistemology as a Method, delivered by Prof. Aparna Rayaprol, University of Hyderabad. The Second Lecture was given by Prof. Ajailiu Nuimai, University of Hyderabad.

Session 1 on Day 1, 28th Dec 2025, there were 6 offline paper presentations and two participants joined online. The theme of the session was Theoretical Revisits and Epistemological Shifts.

The session brought together a rich set of theoretical interventions that revisited classical sociological concepts while engaging with contemporary epistemological debates, particularly from Global South, feminist, decolonial, and post-humanist perspectives. Dr. Suraj Gogoi, Dr. Arya Priya, Yashita Gupta, M Abhinay, Prof. Lekha & Prof. Anthony Palackal, Dr. Reshmi Chakraborty and Dr. Sarbani Sharma presented their papers during this session. The session concluded with the presentation by Dr. Sumit Saurabh Srivastava on intersectionality as both a theoretical and methodological tool.

Session II was conducted in the morning of 29/ 11/ 25, eight presentations were conducted on the theme “Structural Inequalities and Forms of Marginalisation.” Prof. Rukmini Sen, Akanksha Shahi, Suyash Sagar Bajpai, Sayantan Ghosh, Suraj Beri & Ujithra Ponniah, Ayush Kushwaha, Prof. Anil Kumar and Asha Saikia presented papers during the session.

Session III, 29th Dec 2025

The third session began with the presentation by Swatiprava Rath on eco-phenomenology of waste mobility and gender in the Bhubaneswar city. She remained the notion of uselessness to study the relation of gender and objects in the social space of urban life.

Special Lecture

Prof Aparna Rayaprol, University of Hyderabad delivered a special lecture on Feminist Epistemology as a Method. She engaged into a discussion on pedagogy and gender to highlight the framing of gender question which actually defeats the whole purpose of feminist approach. Drawing instances from different cases teaching, care economy, census, labour, population control techniques she foregrounded the feminist position to approach experience as reality. She highlighted the limitations of positivist approach in social research to understand the social life organization and arranged on gendered lines.

Special Lecture by Prof Ajailiu Niumai

She examines the vulnerability of trafficked women in India’s neoliberal economy, where girls from the Northeast are treated as commodities. Linking political economy to the commodification of women’s bodies, she argues sociology must go beyond theory to influence policy. Promoting women’s entrepreneurship and strengthening NGO-led rehabilitation and skill-building, she suggests, can reduce trafficking.

Varun kumar, Divya Mehta, Ramesh Chandra Nayak, MD Junaid, and Repsha Chakraborty were the presenters of the session.

Session V

Jogi presented a paper on role of a figure, Jolly Roger, in online depiction and portrayal of social movements. He engages into a critical theoretical analysis of digital spaces.

Reniya presented her paper on question of mobility drawing on experience and understanding of phenomenological theory. She explored into questions methodological dilemmas of studying mobility.

The **50th All India Sociological Conference (AISC)**, organized by the **Indian Sociological Society (ISS)**, was hosted by **SRM University, Amaravati, Andhra Pradesh**, from **28th to 30th December 2025**. The Research Committee 03 Economy and Society is a dynamic committee to study and discover the changing scenario of India's socio- cultural economy. It focuses on historical transformation of economic systems from agriculturally based society to industrial and now postindustrial societies. As per the vision of the research committee the received abstracts (31 abstracts) were brought under five broader themes like

- Session I-Gendered Mobilities: Economic and Social Transformation
- Session II-Digital Mobilities Reorganization of Economy and Society
- Session III-Everyday Mobilities of Time, Space and Consumption
- Session IV-Margin to Mobility: Economic Transformations of Rural and Tribal India
- Session V-Internal and Transnational Mobilities: Mapping of New Mobilities

The first session held on 28th December 2025 was chaired by Dr. R. Maruthakutti, ICSSR Senior Research Fellow, Former Professor, Department of Sociology, Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Tirunelveli. There were four papers presented by the faculties and scholars. The Session focused on the interconnections between gender, mobility, and economic life in contemporary India. The papers examined women's participation in diverse economic domains including platform capitalism, agriculture, informal markets, drawing on empirical fieldwork, narrative analysis, and preliminary assessments, the session foregrounded women's lived experiences across rural, urban, and digital spaces. The discussion emphasised moving beyond celebratory narratives of empowerment. Participants underscored the need for intersectional feminist analysis that recognizes unpaid labour, informal work, and embodied constraints.

The second session was conducted on 29 December 2025 under the thematic focus on Digital Mobilities and the Reorganization of Economy and Society. The session was chaired by Dr. D. Jayalakshmi, Former Professor and Head, Department of Sociology, University of Madras, Chennai, Tamil Nadu.

There were four presenters their paper. In her opening remarks, She critically reflected on contemporary digital transformations, highlighting issues related to the digital divide, digital disparities, and the broader social repercussions of social media. She emphasized that while digital technologies promise inclusion and efficiency, they also risk reproducing and intensifying existing socio-economic inequalities.

During the Session III, the Dr. D. N. Dhanagare Memorial Lecture by Dr. Sudeshna Mukherjee on “Beyond Subsidies: Rethinking Empowerment and Public Policy” critically examined India’s shift from welfare-based subsidies to empowerment-oriented public policy. The session was chaired by Dr. Jayashree. S, Convener RC03, Senior Professor, Department of Sociology, Karnatak University, Dharwad. The resource person highlighted the examples such as women-centric DBT schemes (Ladli Behna Yojana, Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana) and the JAM framework. She highlighted both welfare gains and emerging fiscal constraints. Emphasis was placed on low female labour force participation, unpaid care work, and the limits of cash transfers in achieving genuine empowerment.

Prof. Ravi Dalawai of Rani Chennamma University in Belagavi presided over the fourth session. Four research papers were presented in this session, with a primary focus on understanding how economic engagement reduces the gender gap and how government programs assist rural artisans in achieving social mobility. Dr. Maruthakutti emphasised the significance of comprehending rural elderly people's everyday sociability. The motion to form an executive committee and hold a workshop and conference was approved during the RC 03 business session, which was called by Dr. Jayashree S., Convener, RC 03.

Mr. Sai Darshan Kumar J. gave a paper on Entrepreneurship As A Quest For Social Equality: The Caste Collectivity of Nadars of Tamil Nadu during the last session, which was presided over by Dr. Jayashree S. The faculty and researchers responded favourably to the sessions and actively participated in the discussions. The 50th AISC was a productive academic event that gave aspiring scholars the opportunity to express themselves and hone their research skills under the guidance of prominent experts.

SPECIAL LECTURE

RC06 Sociology of Religion organised a special talk online on 4th October 2025. The book is titled *Governing Hinduism: State and Ritual Authority in South India* authored by Dr. Shiva Urella, Lector in Telugu, Yale University. The programme was chaired by Dr. Daisy Barman, Co convenor of RC06. The talk evolved from the PHD dissertation of Dr. Shiva on the Ogulvanlu ritual specialists at Rekulakunta, Andhra Pradesh. These ritual specialists sustain Bahujan religious traditions through story telling, drumming and turmeric rituals. Dr. Shiva explores this phenomenon with an intersectional lens spanning gender, caste, religion and state power. In his presentation Dr. Shiva contextualized his work within the regulatory provisions and practices of the state with regard to temples, ritual specialists and worship patterns. Dr. Daisy Barman who chaired the session contextualised the presentation giving a pan-India comparative perspective to how communities seek to sustain their identities by celebrating unique ritual practices.

The research committee organised a book discussion during the 50th All India Sociological Conference at SRM University Andhra Pradesh on 29th December 2025. The discussion was on the recently

published book authored by the secretary of RC06 Dr. P.C. Saidalavi titled Seeking Allah's Hierarchy: Caste, Labour and Islam in India. The discussants were Prof. R. Santhosh, IIT Madras and Dr. Joseph M.T., University of Mumbai. Dr. Daisy Barman, GITAM University chaired the session. A very insightful book with significant implications for Sociology of Religion India, Seeking Allah's Hierarchy demonstrates the craft of reflexive ethnography and grounded arguments. Foregrounding lived Islam in the present day Kerala, the book delves into the complexity of Islam and its relationship with caste. Caste is negotiated and renegotiated among the various Muslim communities with recourse to values attributed to the Islamic worldview. Both the discussants gave a detailed and critical assessment of the volume. Author Saidalavi replied to the discussion on the floor foregrounding the rationale of the work and the uniqueness of methodology and thematic contributions. Dr. Daisy Barman concluded the session with the comments of the chairperson.

50TH ALL INDIA SOCIOLOGICAL CONFERENCE

At RC06 sociology of religion, we received 60 abstracts. In all 39 papers were presented spread across the nine parallel sessions. The papers were of the following broad themes: hierarchy, harmony and the making of religious publics; indigeneity, memory and the re-contextualisation of religious traditions; ritual, embodiment and the social production of the sacred; institutions, law and the governance of religious communities; digital cultures, mediation, and contemporary religious life; caste, inequality and the reconfiguration of religious boundaries; gender, agency and the formation of religious subjectivities; conversion, identity and the transformation of religious selfhood; and mobility, migration and the translocal making of religious worlds. In the 50th All India Sociological Conference, SRM University, Dec 28-30, 2025, RC 07 on Adivasi and Tribal Studies received a total of fifty-seven abstracts, of which forty-nine were accepted. Three presenters were absent, while six participants presented their papers online. Altogether, nine sessions were conducted.



The first joint session commenced with opening remarks by the Convenor, Prof. Sukant Chaudhury, who highlighted contemporary issues related to tribal identity, mobility, inequality, and resistance. This was followed by the Sixth Prof. Vinay Kumar Srivastava Memorial Lecture, delivered by Prof. Nilika Mehrotra of the Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, on “*Gender Concerns in Tribal Studies Today.*” The lecture was chaired by Prof. Paramjit Judge.

The sessions were chaired by Prof. Sukant Chaudhury (Lucknow University), Dr. Arvind N. Haldankar (Goa University), Prof. Soumendra Mohan Patnaik (University of Delhi), Prof. D.

R. Sahu (Lucknow University), Prof. Rita Malache (University of Mumbai), and were co- chaired by Dr. Manoranjan Das (Ravenshaw University), Ishwar Chandra Naik (Ravenshaw University), and Prof. Sangram Gunjal (BAMU, Aurangabad).



The major issues discussed included the following:

1. Scientific studies on tribal societies, particularly those focusing on women, continue to be neglected.
2. Greater emphasis needs to be placed on conceptualising and theorising tribal issues.
3. Inequality, once largely absent, now affects almost all aspects of tribal society.
4. Although substantial funds have been allocated to the tribal development sector, implementation remains weak and ineffective.

5. External encroachment and influences have led to the emergence of practices and changes such as dowry, fragmented lifestyles, eco-entrepreneurship, and religious conversions.
6. Climate change has had a severe impact on tribal communities, with heavy rainfall, droughts, and extreme heat waves adversely affecting agricultural production and livelihoods.

University of Kerala. The lecture was delivered by Prof. Azra Abidi, Head, Department of Sociology, Jamia Millia Islamia, Central University, New Delhi.



Prof. Abidi offered a powerful and deeply engaging analysis of how Muslim women in India navigate the intersecting challenges of patriarchy, religion, and structural inequalities in accessing higher education. She highlighted the systemic barriers of exclusion, the burden of cultural stereotypes, and the role of institutional mechanisms in shaping women's educational trajectories.

Her presentation combined rich empirical insights with theoretical frameworks, underscoring the need for

inclusive policies and social transformation to ensure equal participation of Muslim women in higher education. The session was chaired by Prof. Maitrayee Chaudhary, President, Indian Sociological Society, whose opening remarks set a strong intellectual context for the discussion and emphasized the importance of intersectional approaches in sociology.

Dr. Shabnam Ara, Head, Department of Sociology, Amar Singh College, Srinagar, Kashmir, contributed as the discussant, offering nuanced reflections on the complexities faced by minority women in peripheral regions and reinforcing the lecture's arguments with regional examples.

The lecture was marked by robust intellectual engagement and vibrant discussions, making it a valuable contribution to the ongoing series on gendered challenges in the 21st century.



One-Day National Webinar on “Gender and Violence in Digital Spaces” in Collaboration with Department of Sociology, Dr. M.K Umathe College, Nagpur, October 4, 2025

RC-10, in collaboration with Dr. M. K. Umathe College, Nagpur, organised a one-day national webinar on “Gender and Violence in Digital Spaces: Understanding Problems, Exploring Solutions” (online mode). The webinar addressed urgent concerns around digital vulnerabilities for women and gender minorities, and explored academic and policy responses. The event brought together distinguished academicians, scholars, and participants from across the country to deliberate upon one of the most urgent concerns of the contemporary era — the vulnerabilities and possibilities of digital environments for women and gender minorities.



The inaugural session was chaired by Prof. R. Indira, Former President of the Indian Sociological Society. The welcome address was delivered by Dr. Vinod Khedkar, Convener of the webinar and Assistant Professor of Sociology at Dr. M. K. Umathe College, followed by special messages from Prof. Shweta Prasad, Secretary of ISS, and the Principal of Dr. M. K. Umathe College. Introducing the

theme of the webinar, Dr. Rajni Bala, Convener of RC-10, highlighted how digital spaces, while opening new avenues for communication, visibility, and empowerment, have simultaneously become sites of harassment, exclusion, and violence. The keynote address was delivered by Prof. Abdul Matin, Former Professor, Aligarh Muslim University, who provided a thought-provoking analysis of gender-based digital violence and the inadequacy of legal frameworks to fully address these challenges. Prof. Rajesh Gill, Former Professor, Panjab University, graced the session as Guest of Honour and emphasised the responsibility of academic institutions in responding to the social consequences of digital violence.

The panel discussion that followed, chaired by Prof. Abha Chauhan of the Central University of Himachal Pradesh and Former President of ISS, focused on the theme “Women in the Digital Era: Risks, Rights and Resilience.” Panelists included Prof. Sudeshna Mukherjee, Dr. Usha V. T., Prof. Dhananjay Sontake, and Prof. Leena Pujari.



Their interventions drew attention to multiple dimensions of online gendered violence — from cyberstalking and trolling to structural inequalities in digital access. They also explored possibilities of resilience, solidarity, and legal reform, while questioning the accountability of digital platforms and the need to integrate digital ethics into education.

Two technical sessions were held in the afternoon, where participants from diverse institutions presented their research papers on issues such as online misogyny, trolling, digital activism, women’s experiences of cyber violence, and legal responses. The discussions were marked by academic rigour and constructive feedback, reflecting the seriousness with which younger scholars and researchers are engaging with the theme.

The valedictory session was chaired by Prof. Mahesh Shukla, Professor and Head of Sociology, Govt. TRS College of Excellence, Rewa. The webinar report was presented by Dr. Vinod Khedkar, who summarised the major insights of the day’s deliberations. The valedictory address was delivered by Prof. Ajailiu Niumai, University of Hyderabad, who situated digital violence within larger frameworks

of exclusion and inclusion, and stressed the need for sustained academic engagement with these issues.

Prof. Sandip Chaudhary, Professor and Head, SBES College, Chhatrapati Sambhajnagar, addressed the gathering as Guest of Honour and underscored the importance of mainstreaming digital gender justice within higher education. The session concluded with a vote of thanks delivered by Prof. Apurba Pal, Co-Convener of RC-10. The webinar provided a vibrant platform for academic and social dialogue on a theme of increasing urgency. The deliberations highlighted the dual nature of digital spaces — as enabling platforms for empowerment as well as new terrains of vulnerability.

The participants collectively agreed on the importance of stronger policy frameworks, platform accountability, legal safeguards, and digital literacy programmes to counter gender-based violence online. Above all, the discussions reaffirmed the commitment of RC-10 and the ISS to continuously foreground such pressing gender issues and to ensure that digital environments are reclaimed as spaces of equality, dignity, and freedom.

Special Session of RC-10 Gender Studies in the National Conference on “Development, Democracy and Governance: Debating New Social Imaginaries” held on 31 October – 1 November 2025 at NIPER, Mohali

The Research Committee on Gender Studies (RC-10), Indian Sociological Society, collaborated with the host institutions to organise a dedicated special technical session focusing on gender. This session was organised within the broader framework of the national conference hosted by RC-19 (Urban Studies), ISS, along with the Department of Holistic Education (DHE) and NIPER, Mohali.



The Special Gender Session, titled “Promoting Gender Equality and Women’s Empowerment”, was conducted on 31 October 2025 (11:30 AM – 1:30 PM) at the Board Room, Convention Centre. The session was chaired by Prof. Abha Chauhan, with Prof. Ajailiu Niumai as Co-Chair, and was moderated by Dr. Rajni Bala, Convener, RC-10 (Gender Studies), Indian Sociological Society, thereby formally reflecting RC-10’s academic leadership and institutional presence within the national seminar.

The session brought together a diverse range of research papers addressing women’s empowerment, gender justice, health, education, political participation, caste and community, and lived experiences of marginalisation. Presentations included sociological analyses of rape investigation by women police officers, feminist readings of motherhood, women’s empowerment through theoretical frameworks, struggles of women in rural higher education, breast cancer and society, political participation of Scheduled Caste women, gendered spaces and democratic rights, menopause policy gaps, domestic violence survivors lived realities, and adolescent girls’ health concerns. The thematic breadth of the session reflected RC-10’s long-standing commitment to advancing intersectional and empirically grounded gender scholarship



.The discussions during the session highlighted how gender inequalities intersect with structures of caste, class, health, education, and governance, reinforcing the need for feminist perspectives within debates on development and democracy. Active participation by scholars and researchers enriched the deliberations and underscored the relevance of gender- focused sociological inquiry within national academic Forums.

Mid-Term Conference of RC-10 Gender Studies on the topic “Inclusive Empowerment: Addressing the Needs of Marginalised Women through Intersectional Policies” on 27–28 November 2025

The Research Committee on Gender Studies (RC-10), Indian Sociological Society, in collaboration with the Department of Sociology and the Centre for Women’s Studies, University of Kerala, organised a two-day Mid-Term Conference on the theme “Inclusive Empowerment: Addressing the Needs of Marginalised Women through Intersectional Policies” on 27–28 November 2025 at the Department of Sociology, University of Kerala, Thiruvananthapuram.

The conference was successfully conceptualised and organised under the leadership of Dr. Bushra Beegom R. K., Head, Department of Sociology, and Director, Centre for Women’s Studies, University of Kerala, who also served as the Organising Secretary of the Conference. Special invited lectures by senior faculty members from different teaching departments of the University of Kerala significantly enriched the proceedings, bringing interdisciplinary perspectives on gender, marginalisation, policy, and social justice.

The conference included plenary and technical sessions that provided a robust platform for scholarly exchange. A notable feature of the conference was the enthusiastic participation and high-quality presentations by students, whose papers reflected strong conceptual clarity, empirical grounding, and critical engagement with gender and intersectionality. Their contributions were widely appreciated and underscored the importance of nurturing young feminist scholars within academic spaces.

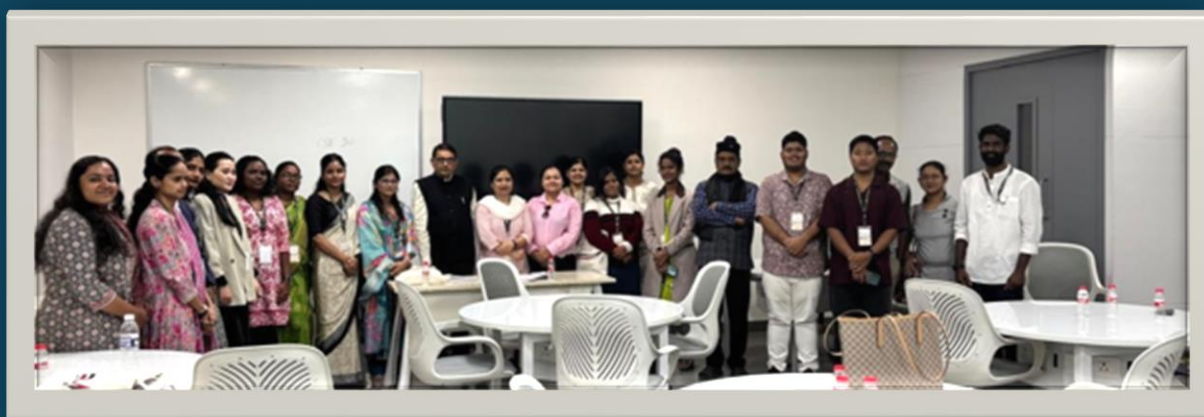
The valedictory session brought together senior scholars and members of RC-10, with reflections on the academic deliberations and future directions for intersectional feminist research. The conference

Academic writing workshop

In November 2025 [27 & 28], the Department of Sociology, University of Mumbai in collaboration with Department of Sociology, HSNC University, Mumbai as well as RC 06- Sociology of Religion, RC 11- Sociology of Environment & Ad Hoc RC-01- Pedagogy, Teaching & Learning, organised a two day Academic Writing Workshop titled- ‘Doing Academic Writing Differently’. Financial support for the workshop was received from the ISS. The workshop examined the journey of academic writing that involves a reflexive process alongside the analysis of data. It highlighted the need to pay attention to certain key features of research- accountability, awareness of power relations, of difference, of multiple voices and where the research stories are layered. It foregrounded the messy processes of academic writing. The session began with an address by Prof. Maitrayee Chaudhuri, President of the Indian Sociological Society, who placed strong emphasis on reading as a non- negotiable foundation of writing. Prof. Vivek, Treasurer Indian Sociological Society and the Guest of Honour offered a more practice-oriented perspective on writing. The inaugural address was delivered by Prof. Indra Munshi who emphasised academic writing as having a distinct genre with its own specific demands. The two day workshop covered various topics and sessions ranging from Prof. Anagha Tambe’s session on the politics of citation and knowledge production-Reading the Absences, Prof. Sharmila Sreekumar’s on - Staying with the Problem: On Re-framing and Re-formulating Research, Prof. Gita Chadha on - Self and the Politics of Knowledge Production: Feminist Auto ethnographies as Social Science; Prof. Rituparna Patagiri explored the contours of academic writing in the digital age, Prof. Meena Gopal

examined how feminist thinking shapes writing women's lives that spans a range of embodiment: from performance to labour, Prof. Vaishali Diwakar's session was- on Academic Writing: Knowledge, Reflexivity, and Practice in the Global South and Prof. Bindhulakshmi P. Session was on - Citing from the margins-examining how academic citation practices reproduce hierarchies of caste, ability, gender, and geography in the production of knowledge & acknowledges knowledge as relational, situated, and embodied. The workshop was attended by over 60 research scholars and Master's students of both the Universities.

In December [28-30 2025], for the National Conference at SRM University,-AP Amaravati, RC 11 received 36 Abstracts in all. Twenty three presentations were made in all. Out of these there were 3 Virtual presentations.

The broad themes ranged from climate change issues, impact of infrastructure projects on the environment, the loss of biodiversity, traditional land management systems, issues related to solar power and its lived environments, issues of peri urban and suburban environment, ecotourism, Forest governance reforms, issues of water, air quality and so on.

The Business meeting of the RC was conducted on 29th December during afternoon session with Prof. Balaji Kendre as chair. It was stated that Dr. Amarpal Singh has successfully carried out his responsibility as chair of RC 11 for 2 consecutive terms. Report of 50th All India Sociological Conference held from December 28th to 30th, 2025, at SRM University-AP, Andhra Pradesh.

Session Overview and Themes

The RC 12 organized the paper presentations in eight sessions, covering four primary themes focused on contemporary sociological issues in health and wellness:

1. Gender, Women's Health, and Reproductive Rights (Day 1): Addressed maternal health, menstruation, PCOD, and gender disparities in healthcare access.
2. Traditional Medicine, Technology, and Modern Healthcare Systems (Day 2): Focused on Ayurveda, digital health literacy, medical pluralism, and healthcare infrastructure.
3. Geriatric Health, Ageing, and Elderly Care (Day 2): Examined challenges in old age homes, elder abuse, pension policies, and the impact of migration on the elderly.
4. Social Inequality, Mental Health, and Public Wellness (Day 3): Covered poverty, chronic diseases (Cancer/TB), disability, and mental well-being in marginalized communities.

Presentation Statistics

Across the three days, a total of 71 presenters successfully presented their papers out of 94 approved abstracts. The following table details the participation for each session:

- **Diverse Research Topics:** Papers ranged from the sociocultural determinants of postpartum depression and the impact of digital health literacy to the feminization of ageing and health perceptions among the urban homeless.
- **Hybrid Participation:** Session 4(B) included an online link to accommodate remote presentations, facilitating broader engagement.
- **Leadership:** Individual sessions were chaired by senior academics including Dr. Alok Kumar, Dr. Ziyauddin K.M., Prof. Udai Bhan Singh, and Prof. (Dr.) S.K. Ramani.

RC-15: Agrarian and Rural Studies

The Research Committee on Agrarian and Rural Studies (RC 15) of the Indian Sociological Society organised a series of academic sessions during the 50th All India Sociological Conference. The RC conducted five thematic sessions over three days, with 36 papers scheduled, covering a wide range of issues related to agrarian change and rural transformation in India.

Academic Sessions

Session I: Agrarian Change, Intermediaries and Rural Society

This session comprised nine papers and focused on changes in agrarian relations and rural social structures. Papers examined land ownership patterns, caste and class relations, tenancy and lease arrangements, and the role of intermediaries in agricultural production and marketing systems.

The session highlighted the continued centrality of land in shaping rural inequalities, even as agrarian relations are being reconfigured through market forces, state interventions, and new institutional arrangements.

Session II: Migration and New Ruralities

This session included eight papers addressing migration as a key dimension of contemporary rural life. Presentations analysed seasonal and circular migration, youth mobility, changing livelihood strategies, tourism-driven rural change, climate-related stress, and transformations in rural social organisation. The session demonstrated that migration has become integral to rural social reproduction and must be understood as constitutive of emerging ruralities rather than merely as a response to agrarian distress.

Session III: Gender and Policy in Rural and Agrarian Contexts

Comprising five papers, this session focused on gendered dimensions of agrarian and rural change. Papers examined women's participation in agriculture, access to education and resources, decision-making processes, and the impact of state policies and welfare schemes. The discussions highlighted the uneven outcomes of policy interventions and reaffirmed the importance of gender as a critical analytical category in agrarian and rural studies.

Session IV: Agrarian Crisis, Movements and Emerging Trends

This session featured eight papers addressing the ongoing agrarian crisis and emerging forms of collective action. Presentations examined farmers' indebtedness, neoliberal transformations in agriculture, structural continuities in rural political economy, and agrarian movements. The session underscored the continuing relevance of land, debt, and social mobilisation in understanding contemporary agrarian dynamics.

Session V: Youth, Emergent Ruralities and Mobilities

This session, with six papers, focused on rural youth, education, social mobility, digital media, entrepreneurship, and changing perceptions of agriculture. The papers addressed emerging forms of rural aspiration and mobility and their implications for the future of agrarian and rural societies.

Many interesting and relevant programmes were conducted under RC 17 Collective action, Mobilization and Social Movements of Indian Sociological Society in the year of 2025.

A two-day workshop on ‘Academic Writing and Publication’ was organized by Dr. Terbi Loyi in the state university of Arunachal Pradesh in Collaboration with RC 17 in Hybrid mode on 13th and 14th November 2025. In this workshop total 60 students participated (25 offline and 35 online). We would like to thank President. Prof. Maitrayee Chaudhuari, Secretary, Prof. Shweta Prasad and Treasurer Prof. Vivek for the support and encouragement for organizing this workshop. This workshop helps RC 17 not only to get connected with State University in Arunachal Pradesh but also help to get new young members as well.

The second programme was organized by Department of Sociology Savitribai Phule Pune University Pune organized on 15th December 2025 on ‘Subject Centred Approach to the Study of Social Movements’ in collaboration with RC 17 of ISS. For 50th All India Sociological Conference on Mobilities and Inequalities: Shifting Context; Changing Paradigms held on 28th to 30th December 2025 in SRM University, Amravathi AP. Under RC 17 Collective Action, Mobilization and Social Movements total 21 abstracts received and 13 abstracts were selected by the scrutiny committee. The Presentations were divided into 4 Sessions. The first session of Research Committee 17 begun with Prof. A. R. 50th All India Sociological Conference, SRM AP, 28-30 December, 2025.

Academic Sessions: RC 19 received 40 papers and selected 36 papers for presentation. It organised 4 technical sessions (24) and inaugural (5 lectures) and valedictory sessions (5 lectures) and had key lecture (8). In total 42 presentations were made.

Keeping in view the overall theme of the conference RC19 selected its theme, "Urban Inequalities and Mobilities: Shifting Contexts, Changing Paradigms," to capture the emerging urban realities. In last 3 days RC-19 organised four technical sessions besides inaugural and technical sessions.

On 28th, Convenor of the RC 19 welcomed the invited speakers and introduced the theme of the programme and various technical sessions. He highlighted that Urban spaces are expanding rapidly, but this expansion has not benefited everyone equally. While cities promise opportunity, mobility, and growth, they also produce exclusion, insecurity, and new forms of inequality. The aim of RC19 sessions was to critically engage with these contradictions and understand how urban life is being reshaped in contemporary India.

Technical Session I focused on Urban Inequalities, Exclusion, and Socio-Spatial Marginalisation in which 6 papers were presented.

Session II focused on the theme of Migration, Labour, Informality, and Urban Livelihoods, in which 8 papers were presented.

Session III on Urban Spaces, Land Transformations, Governance, and City-Making, in which 4 papers were presented.

Finally, the 4th Technical Session focused on Urban Mobilities, Digital Cities, Crime, Environment, and New Urban Challenges, in which 6 papers were presented.

Two lectures were delivered by key speakers in each of the technical sessions.

In Inaugural sessions Professor Anirban Banerjee delivered the inaugural address, Professor M. Thamilarasan the keynote address, and Professor Manish Verma Chaired the session. Prof Sujata Patel gave a special address which we recorded and will be circulated to the members.

The Valedictory Session was addressed by Prof. Anand Kumar, Prof. R Indira and Prof. Debal Singharoy and Prof. Kulwinder Kaur.

Besides young students, research scholars and faculty about 18 lectures by senior and eminent sociologists were delivered as keynote lectures and invited lectures. Ad Hoc Group 01: Pedagogy, Teaching and Learning

October – December 2025

The Managing Committee of Indian Sociological Society in its meeting held on 9th March, 2024 approved the Adhoc Research Committee on Pedagogy, Teaching and Learning. Recognizing the need for a space that would enable a meaningful discussion of the practice of sociology in the classrooms, the Research Committee soon after its formation, initiated an online lecture series on Teaching and learning practices within the classroom. This series aims at foregrounding the classroom as an important site of the teaching, learning process. Classrooms are where we belong, practice our craft and do our sociologies.

Teaching, Reading and Writing in the age of AI

A session on Teaching, Reading and Writing Sociology in the age of AI was held on 11th October in collaboration with AI and Society Research Lab, Gitam University. Dr Rakesh Krishnan from Gitam University chaired the session and the panelists included Dr Suraj Beri from Nagaland University, Dr Sambit Mallick from IIT Guwahati, Dr Roma Bhattacharya from Gitam University and Dr Debapriya Ganguly from Savitribai Phule University, Pune. The session witnessed scintillating discussions around a theme that has generated a lot of interest as well as apprehension, anxieties and fears about invisible algorithms, the interplay between AI and social structures and the question of agency. In this context the panelists raised critical questions about access, design, location of AI generated data and sources of origin, the seemingly infallible nature of content in AI and what if AI is wrong? What could be the possible ramifications for research and the researcher?

Senseing a shift: the audio-visual turn in pedagogical practices in Sociology

Dr Rituparna Patgiri from the department of Humanities and Social Sciences, IIT Guwahati spoke on a very pertinent theme on ‘Senseing a shift: the audio-visual turn in Sociology on the 19th of November. She established the context of the emergence of Doing Sociology- an academic blog dedicated to promoting sociological consciousness among young students and scholars and explained the need for meaningful pedagogical tools such as blogs and podcasts in the times we live in.

Workshop on Doing Academic Writing Differently

An ISS sponsored workshop on ‘Doing Academic Writing Differently’ was organized on 27th and 28th November by the departments of Sociology of University of Mumbai and HSNC University, Mumbai in collaboration with Research Committees 6 on Sociology of Religion and Research Committee 11 on

Sociology of Environment. Spread over two days the workshop saw insightful presentations by a diverse set of scholars on varied aspects of Academic Writing.

50th All India Sociological Conference, SRM University

For the 50th AISC we received a total of 25 abstracts of which 19 were presented over 3 thematic sessions that included Teaching and Learning Sociology: Pedagogical Reflections, Learning in Digital Spaces, Pedagogical Practices in Schools and other Sites of Learning, there were a few last-minute dropouts despite registration.

Special Lecture

We had a special lecture on Critical Pedagogy for Transformative Education which was delivered by Prof Meenakshi Thapan.

Panels

We had two very engaging panels. First Panel was on The Creative Classroom: Experimental Pedagogies across media, methods and material world and the second panel was on Bots talking to Bots: Pedagogy in the times of AI.

Release of RC Newsletter

The inaugural newsletter of ADHOC RC 1, titled Pedagogic Chronicles was released. This newsletter is a collection of short essays, articles and poems around the central theme of the RC.

Business Meeting

Business Meeting held on Day One discussed the possibility of publishing select papers in a good journal and that a core committee would look into it. Some suggestions were received on the possible themes for RC online sessions.

Ad Hoc Group 02: Indian Sociology and Knowledge Systems

The Ad Hoc Group–02 on Indian Sociology and Knowledge Systems, under the aegis of the Indian Sociological Society (ISS), New Delhi, successfully organized a series of academic sessions at SRM University–AP from 28 to 30 December 2025. The group was convened by Dr. Vikash Kumar with Dr. Karunakar Singh as Co-Convenor.

The conference witnessed wide academic participation from faculty members and research scholars representing universities and institutions across the country. The conference witnessed participation of over 96 paper presenters, with 75 presenting in offline mode across 10 sessions in 3 classrooms and around 21 presenters participating through online sessions. The enthusiastic involvement of participants in both modes enriched the quality of discussions and reflected the growing relevance and inclusiveness of the Ad Hoc Group on Indian Sociology and Knowledge Systems.

Over the course of three days, the Ad Hoc Group 2 organized multiple parallel paper-presentation sessions, including offline and online modes. More than a hundred research papers were presented, covering a wide thematic spectrum such as Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS), decolonization of social sciences, family and kinship, gender, tribal and indigenous knowledge, religion and ritual practices, education, health, environment, technology, migration, governance, and contemporary challenges like artificial intelligence and digitalization. Special emphasis was laid on sociological reinterpretations of classical texts, folk traditions, oral narratives, and indigenous practices.

The Ad-hoc Group 2 programme commenced with a special lecture on 28th Dec. by Prof. Vivek Kumar (JNU) on “Indian Knowledge System in Indian Sociology: Re-Visiting Benoy Kumar Sarkar.” The lecture critically revisited the idea of Sarkar’s sociological thought and emphasized the need for epistemic decolonization and contextual theorization in Indian sociology. The session set a strong intellectual tone for subsequent deliberations.



A Special Lecture Session of Prof. Anand Kumar on “Indian Knowledge Discourse and Its Challenges” was conducted on 29th December, who critically examined the challenges and possibilities of Indian Knowledge Discourse in contemporary sociology. Their interventions highlighted methodological pluralism, ethical concerns, and the relevance of indigenous perspectives in addressing modern social inequalities. The sessions were marked by rigorous discussions, constructive feedback, and active engagement between presenters and chairpersons.



Finally, on 30th December a Valedictory session was organised. Prof. Awadh Bihari Singh (Head and Dean Veer Kuwar Singh University, Bihar; Prof. B.B. Malik (Former Head, Baba Bhim Rao Ambedkar, University and MC member ISS); Prof. Dileep Kahairnar (MC member ISS); Prof. Dhruv Kumar Dikshit (Kesharwani College, Jabalpur, M.P) were presented in this Valedictory session.

Overall, the conference successfully advanced scholarly dialogue on Indian Sociology and Knowledge Systems, strengthened academic engagements, and reaffirmed the importance of indigenous

sociological perspectives in understanding contemporary Indian society. The event concluded with optimism regarding the future contributions of Ad Hoc Group–02 to sociological scholarship in India.

Future Roadmap

Vision

Ad-Hoc Group–02 seeks to emerge as a dynamic and intellectually rigorous platform for advancing Indian sociological thought grounded in indigenous knowledge systems, while critically engaging with contemporary social realities and global sociological discourse.

Academic and Methodological Orientation

The Group will focus on strengthening sociological engagement with Indian traditions of knowledge. Emphasis will be placed on demonstrating the universal relevance of Indian knowledge systems and their applicability to present-day social challenges. Future activities will involve sustained scholarly engagement with the works of key Indian sociologists and thinkers such as B. K. Sarkar, Radha Kamal Mukerjee, G. S. Ghurye, P. H. Prabhu, and Irawati Karve. etc. Further, the Group will promote sociological readings of Vedic, Buddhist, Jain, folk, and regional traditions, emphasizing India’s long-standing epistemic pluralism. Classical texts will be approached critically.

Contemporary Relevance

Discussions will link IKS with nation-building, social cohesion, value education, family transformation, gender relations, ethics, ecology, and sustainability. Indian Knowledge Systems will be presented as living and evolving, rather than static or nostalgic traditions. Way Forward With growing participation and intellectual vibrancy, Ad-Hoc Group–02 aims to contribute meaningfully to the consolidation of Indian sociology rooted in indigenous knowledge systems, strengthening its relevance at national and international levels.

Annual Activity Report (September–December 2025)

Lecture: Masculinity and the Rongmei Naga’s Custom of Eating Pig Testicles

- Speaker: Richard Kamei, Royal Thimphu College, Bhutan
- Date: 4 September 2025

The lecture examined the cultural meanings of masculinity among the Rongmei Naga through the customary practice of eating pig testicles. Drawing on ethnographic insights, it explored how food

practices are embedded in gendered identities, ritual performance, and social hierarchies within indigenous contexts.

50th AISC

The 50th All India Sociological Conference (AISC) witnessed a vibrant and thought-provoking session centered on the sociology of food, bringing together diverse perspectives on taste, identity, memory, and political economy. The RC received 19 abstracts, of which 12 papers were selected for presentation, reflecting both the thematic richness and the growing scholarly interest in food studies within sociology.

The presentations traversed a wide range of themes. Papers such as Sanchita Das's exploration of Calcutta cuisine as a marker of social distinction and Samiksha Dave and Aribam Bijayasundari Devi's analysis of food, caste politics, and identity foregrounded the deeply stratified and political nature of food practices in India. Expanding this discussion, Bijayasundari Aribam examined the vegetarian–non-vegetarian debate in relation to the state and individual freedom.

Several contributions engaged with sensory and affective dimensions of food. Ishita Dey's work on smells and placemaking among migrant workers and Priyam Chatterjee's evocative account of shutki maach and memory highlighted how food is experienced, remembered, and negotiated through the senses. Similarly, Rajanya Dey's paper on eco-feminist foodscapes and Kiranmayi Bhushi's study of food blogs as visual archives opened up new methodological and conceptual directions.

Other papers focused on questions of mobility, transformation, and region. Pawan Baraik's autoethnographic reflection on food and adaptation in Poland, Praapti Sarma's study of rice wine and agrarian change in Assam, and Sabari Girisan's engagement with agro-geographical identities illustrated how food connects local worlds to broader socio-economic processes. Akash Jyoti Barthakur's paper on opium use and modern medicine and Prajot Pradeep Asolkar's exploration of Marwari culinary diasporas in Goa further underscored the intersections of tradition, modernity, and identity.



The session was enriched by two special panels. The panel on “Food and Political Economy”, featuring Debal Deb, Dolly Kikon, and Krishnendu Ray (moderated by Vandana Swami), examined structural

and economic dimensions shaping food systems. The second panel, “The Sensory Politics of Food: Embodiment, Experience, and Everyday Worlds”, with Kiranmayi Bhushi, Ishita Dey, and Rituparna Patgiri (moderated by Sebanti Chatterjee), brought attention to lived experiences and sensory engagements with food.

Overall, the session highlighted the centrality of food as a lens to understand social hierarchies, cultural practices, and political processes, making it one of the most engaging and interdisciplinary segments of the conference.

Ad Hoc Group 04: Visual Sociology

Objectives of the Ad Hoc Group

The primary objectives of the Ad Hoc Group on Visual Sociology are:

To explore visual, audiovisual, and digital methods as tools for sociological research.

To engage with visual culture, representation, and ethics in sociological inquiry.

To create a platform for interdisciplinary dialogue between sociology, anthropology, and visual/media studies.

To encourage methodological innovation in research and pedagogy.

Annual regular activities

‘Unfolding Visual Sociology.’

On August 25, 2025, the Visual Sociology Ad-hoc Group hosted its inaugural event, ‘Unfolding Visual Sociology’ as a roundtable discussion aimed at reimagining the future of visual research beyond disciplinary boundaries.

Led by Dr. Ankita and Dr. Sebanti, the session explored visuality as a bridge between history and sociology. Key themes included feminist and queer readings of visual media, the visibility of disability, the affective and sensory dimensions of images, and innovative methodologies such as patchwork and collaborative fieldwork. The interdisciplinary dialogue—featuring scholars from history and sociology—highlighted visuality as a shared intellectual terrain. The presence of Prof. Maitrayee Chaudhuri, President of the Indian Sociological Society, added significant depth, particularly regarding the future of visual studies in India.

With nearly 100 participants, the roundtable embodied a decolonial and participatory format, encouraging collaborative listening and bottom-up knowledge production.

From Akharha to Videography : Changing Contours of Musical Performance in Punjab

A lecture was organised by Prof. Judge on 30th October 2025. Prof. Paramjit Judge traced the sociological transformation of Punjabi performance music from intimate spaces like akharas and fairs to radio, television, and digital platforms, arguing that these shifts were deeply social rather than merely

technological. He highlighted how changes in audience composition, caste and religious identities, patronage, and performance practices reshaped the cultural field.

From early traditions such as Marasi music and classical gharanas to the diaspora-driven pop boom and today's YouTube era, he examined evolving political economies of music, visual cultures of masculinity and violence, and shifting gender representations. He concluded by inviting critical reflection on how technology, power, and cultural memory shape contemporary practices of seeing and listening.

“The Sound of a Metal Pipe Meeting Flesh: Textile Painting and Women's Labor in Nagaland”

The group hosted a guest lecture titled “The Sound of a Metal Pipe Meeting Flesh: Textile Painting and Women's Labor in Nagaland.” The session examined art, gendered labor, and political resistance in Northeast India.

Dr. Tankha analyzed the work of painter Iris Odyuo, challenging the classification of “tribal craft” by situating textile painting as a political and artistic response. The lecture addressed women's labor within overlapping patriarchies of state and custom, and highlighted materiality and violence as central to visual expression.

Methodologically, the talk emphasized positionality, collaborative knowledge production, and the textile as a visual text documenting suffering and resilience.

In her concluding remarks, Prof. Patricia Uberoi situated the lecture within the broader trajectory of Visual Sociology in India, underscoring the visual as a site of labor, history, and contestation. The session ended with a rich discussion on indigenous aesthetics and sociological research.

50th AISC Conference Session Details

The Ad Hoc Group organised four sessions over three days as part of the RC programme. These included an inaugural session, paper presentation sessions, film screenings, and discussions.

Summary of Sessions

RC Session 1: Inaugural Session (8 December)

The inaugural session opened with remarks by Prof. Satish Sharma and Prof. Vaishali Diwakar, outlining the aims and scope of Ad Hoc Group 04. The inaugural address was delivered by Prof. S. M. Patnaik, who traced the evolution of Visual Anthropology in India from its colonial origins to contemporary reflexive practices. He emphasised the use of visual methods as analytical tools rather than ends in themselves, and encouraged engagement with indigenous visual traditions to advance decolonial perspectives.

The session included a screening and discussion of *Music of the Same Heaven* with Prof. Kamala Ganesh, based on her ethnographic research on a Telugu Muslim Dudekula community of musicians. The film highlighted historically fluid religious identities and cultural exchange. The session concluded with a discussion led by Prof. Parmit Singh Judge, focusing on changing musical practices in Punjab and the incorporation of folk traditions into popular cultural platforms.

RC Session 2: Paper Presentations (29 December, 8:30–10:30 AM)

This session featured four paper presentations addressing diverse thematic and methodological concerns within Visual Sociology. Dr. Swatiprava Rath examined urban life in Bhubaneswar through auto-ethnographic visuals. Dr. Pratichi Majumdar presented a critical analysis of AI-generated art,

focusing on questions of authorship and meaning. Dr. Lekha analysed the commercialisation of private festivals in Kerala using visual documentation. Krithika N. Iyer employed photography to examine the role of women voluntary workers in the development bureaucracy in Kerala, highlighting gendered labour and institutional structures.

RC Session 3: Film Screening and Discussion (29 December, 3:30–5:30 PM)

This session comprised an online screening of selected clips from *Bidesia* in Bambai, followed by an interaction with filmmaker Surabhi Sharma. The discussion focused on labour, migration, and Bhojpuri music in Bombay, demonstrating the value of film and audiovisual methods for sociological analysis and public engagement.

RC Session 4: Paper Presentations (30 December 2025, 8:30–10:30 AM)

The session featured four papers examining contemporary social processes through visual analysis. Dr. Vaishali Joshi analysed pet advertising and post-humanist consumer desire; Millo Riya examined the aestheticisation of Ziro Valley and gendered labour in tourism imagery; Anna Zacharias discussed visual art projects and identity formation among the Jewish community in Kerala; and Dr. Arjun Jadhav analysed the visual politics of the Maratha Reservation Movement. The session concluded with a focused discussion on the role of visuals in shaping social meanings and collective identities.

Participation and Engagement

The sessions were well attended and generated active discussion among participants. Discussions addressed both paper-specific questions and broader methodological concerns related to visual methods, ethics, and representation in sociological research.

Outcomes of the ad hoc group activities

Strengthened interdisciplinary engagement around visual methods in sociology.

Identification of key methodological and ethical concerns in visual research.

Recognition of film and visual material as important tools for sociological analysis and pedagogy.

Future Activities

The Ad Hoc Group plans to organise regular activities, including:

Workshops on visual analysis and the ethics of visual research.

Training sessions on short ethnographic filmmaking.

Sessions on the use of visuals in research and teaching.

Documentary and short film screenings followed by discussions with filmmakers.
